Executive Summary

On 11 June 2012 City Council authorized the submission of an application to the US Department of Justice for the 2012 BJA Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant in the amount of \$4,198.50 via Resolution 12-14. This grant is an annual submission that funds a reimbursement to the City of Henderson for 50% of the purchase price and shipping on individual law enforcement ballistic vests purchased for Henderson Police Officers. This years' allocation for available reimbursements is \$4,198.50. Notice has been received of grant award in the amount requested; therefore, it is appropriate for Council to accept the grant by approving Resolution 12-A-14.

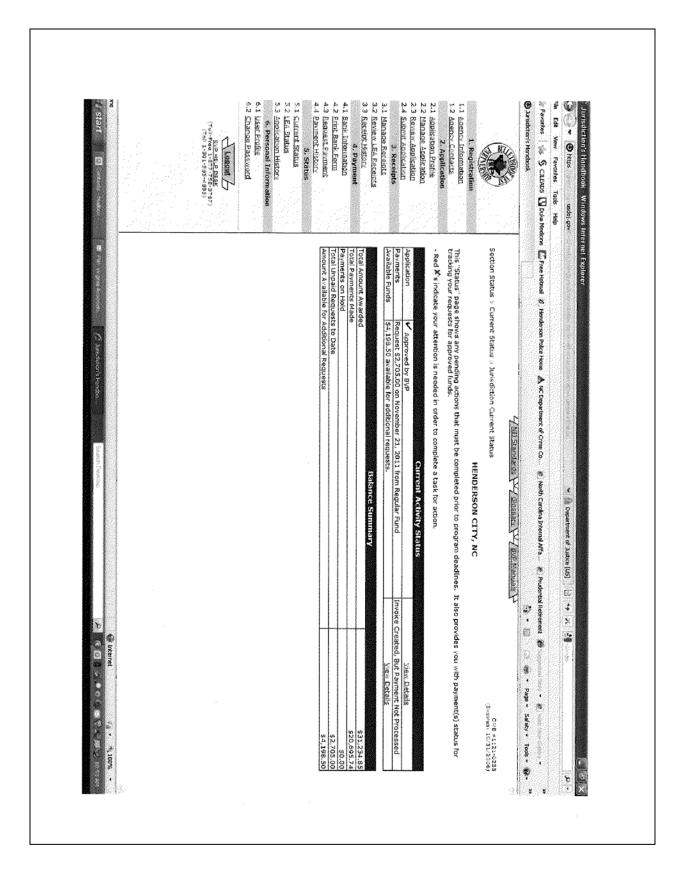

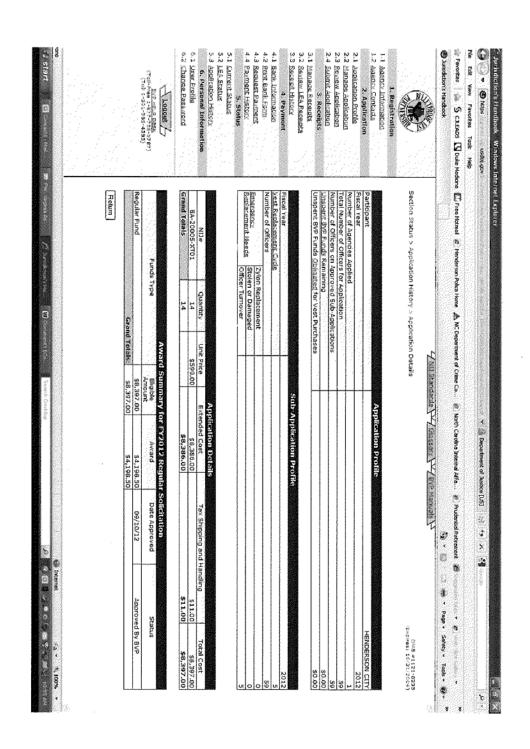

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Council Retreat Goals Addressed By This Item:

• KSO 4- To Improve Condition of the Housing Stock

Recommendation:

Approval of the concept for the Flint Hill CDBG Catalyst Grant application and authorize the Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments planning staff and City planning staff to prepare said application.

Executive Summary:

On 15 October 2012, a Public Hearing was held to present information to the Citizens of Henderson and the City Council regarding the 2012 Community Development Block Grant Catalyst Program. This comprehensive program allows various grant activities including housing activities, community revitalization, special project public facilities and public service. At that time, the plan was to use these funds to develop projects and improvements in the Embassy/Orange/Breckenridge corridors as well as other projects in the core downtown area.

After hearing comments from the citizens, it was determined by Council that more planning and research was needed, as well as citizen input before any decisions should be made. It was generally agreed a key focus area should be the Flint Hill community. Subsequently, a work shop was conducted on 29 October 2012 by the Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments and the City of Henderson's Planning Department in order to receive more citizen input and hear their concerns.

Citizens present at the public meeting articulated concerns for and identified projects they felt would be important, including: transient housing, housing renovation and rental assistance, demolition of abandoned structures, affordable housing construction, storm drainage, homeless shelter, street improvements, clean up the creek, clean up vacant lots and crack down on bad landlords.

Based on these comments and concerns, staff developed a concept for the Flint Hill community that would address demolition of substandard, abandoned structures, revitalization of some homes, address

infrastructure and recreation needs and work to develop neighborhood capacity to strengthen pride and ownership within the community.

The concept is to set forth a three-year grant cycle plan that would accomplish these goals. Even with three grant cycles, there will be insufficient funds to address all of the needs and issues within the community; however, it will provide a good start and with the capacity building efforts, it is hoped third party partnerships can be established to further address needs and issues.

Generally speaking, the grant concept would be staged as follows:

- Year 1: Demolition of abandoned structures; housing renovation; neighborhood capacity building, etc.
- Year 2: New housing construction, infrastructure upgrades, housing renovation
- Year 3: Infrastructure upgrades, housing renovation, parks and recreation upgrades

If Council approves this direction in the grant application, a Public Hearing will be held on the fourth Monday of November during the regular Council Meeting. Subsequent to the public hearing, Council will be asked to approve a Resolution approving submission of the grant. The grant submission deadline is the end of November.

I. CALL TO ORDER Erris Dunston, Planning and Community Development Director

II. WELCOME

Erris Dunston welcomed all the citizens to the meeting and explained this was a meeting to gather ideas from the community regarding an upcoming Community Development Block Grant Catalyst application for the 2012 funding cycle.

City Manager Ray Griffin explained the absence to Mayor James D. O'Geary and Councilwoman Brenda Peace-Jenkins.

III. PURPOSE/DESCRIPTION OF THE GRANT

Rick Seekins from Kerr Tar Regional Council of Government explained the different activities of catalyst grants including housing, community revitalization, public facilities and public service.

IV. COMMUNITY RESPONSE

There were questions from citizens:

Elissa Yount: Asked about the median income, whether these funds could be used to resolve existing drainage problems, and did the city have a plan for community development?

Eugene Burton: Asked could these fund fix the existing street problem in the Flint Hill neighborhood and could this grant help with the problem of abandon weeded lots.

Kenneth Judkins: Expressed concerns about the idea of tearing down houses, he explained his option regarding rebuilding the Flint Hill neighborhood.

Deryl Von Williams: Expressed concerns about people not having jobs therefore not being able to afford to buy homes. She was also concerned about grant projects being administered to ensure fairness for all citizens.

Joel Rice: Expressed concerns about this problem of homelessness

Mike Ciriello from Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Government led a group activity in which the Citizens were asked of the listed activity options, which two would, they select. They majority of the selections were housing revitalization and transitional housing. There was a second part of this activity in which each citizen was given \$500,000 in fake money, they were asked to write on each \$100,000 bill, which grant

activity they buy with the money. The COG Staff will analyze the citizen's responses.

V. NEXT STEPS

There will be a City Council meeting scheduled for early next week so they Council will be able to ask on information gathered at this meeting.

A part of the 2012 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program

Program Categories of the Catalyst program include:

- Housing Activities
- > Community Revitalization
- Special Projects Public Facilities
- Public Service (according to Section 105 (a)(8) of the Housing & Community Development Act)

Within each of those Program Activities can include:

Housing:

This can include rehabilitation, acquisition, clearance, relocation, substantial rehabilitation, replacement housing, or emergency repairs.

Housing development projects may focus on single family or multi-unit development and can be single location or scattered locations. All must meet LMI requirements.

This option focuses on the infrastructure support for the development, however, the construction of the housing itself must come from another source and can be used as part of the match for the grant. Infrastructure may include:

- Water and sewer lines,
- Water and sewer line hook-ups,
- Parks and/or playgrounds,
- Streets, curbs and gutters,
- Flood and drainage, or
- Sidewalks/pedestrian improvements

Additional Special Needs Housing projects may be included, with 100% LMI service. It includes basically the same set of services listed above (acquisition, disposition, clearance and remediation, or relocation).

Community Revitalization:

At least two needs of an area must be met. One of those needs must be housing (using similar definitions and activities as outlined above) and the other need must be one of the following:

- Streets,
- Sidewalks/pedestrian ways,
- · Curbs and gutters,
- Parks and/or playgrounds,
- Greenways,
- Water and sewer lines,
- Flood and drainage improvements, or
- Trees

All activities in this category must meet 100% LMI persons of meet slim pr blight national objective, and require a Redevelopment Plan be submitted.

Housing activities must be provided real property that is owned and occupied prior to selection of the property for service. The development of selection committees, screening for income and all of the other prior requirements for prior CDBG housing projects seem to be continued under this category.

Special Project Public Facilities

These are buildings and improvements that are publicly owned or traditionally provided by a government or a non-profit agency, providing that the buildings are open to the public. They may include the following:

- · Shelters for the abused or homeless,
- Transitional facilities for the abused or homeless,
- · Senior and/or community, neighborhood, or recreational center

Facility must serve at least 51% LMI.

Activities for those facilities may include the following:

- Acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or installation of facilities or improvements,
- Removal of material and architectural barriers that restrict mobility and access,
- Include energy efficiency upgrades,
- Include design features that enhance the quality of facilities,
- Improvements such as parks, playgrounds, and greenways, and

- Facilities for special needs populations are not subject to hew housing construction or other rules, and include:
 - Homeless shelters, convalescent homes, hospitals, nursing homes, battered spouse shelters, halfway houses for runaways, drug abusers or parolees, group homes for mentally retarded people or shelter for disaster victims.

Public Service:

- Foreclosure Prevention Programs
- Individual Development Accounts (IDAs) Two components including:
 - Housing Services A wide range of homeowner education and counseling services to assist homebuyers in owning and maintaining a home, and
 - o Down Payment saving and accrual assistance

This program requires involvement of other programs to assist with support for identification and selection and preparation of homebuyers, as well as matching amount saved for down payment and financial institutions that can provide Technical Assistance to program.

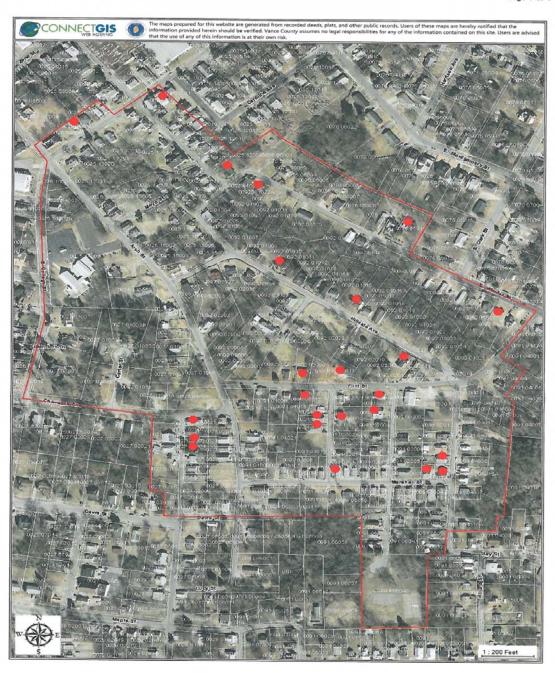

- Approval of Ordinance 12-78, FY13 Budget Amendment #17 Amending the CIP Sewer Fund Relative to the Engineering Services for the Sandy Creek Pump Station Improvements Project.

Executive Summary

City Council approved, via Resolution 12-18, the application for a State Revolving Fund Grant/Loan at the 27 February 2012 Council meeting for the Sandy Creek Pump Station Improvements.

On 3 April 2012, The City received notification from the Infrastructure Finance Section (IFS), (formerly the Construction Grants and Loan Section), that the City's application had been

reviewed and the Sandy Creek Pump Station Improvements Project found eligible to receive a low interest CWSRF loan in the amount of \$1,800,000, of which \$900,000 is in the form of principal forgiveness, with the balance at the prevailing CWSRF interest rate at the time of approval by the Local Government Commission (LGC). The Grant/Loan was accepted by the City via Resolution 12-A-18 on 29 May 2012. The preliminary engineering report was approved by the State on 5 October 2012 and the next step in the process is to proceed with the plans and specifications which have to be submitted by 3 June 2013, as indicated in the schedule below.

In order to proceed with this project, the City must meet the deadlines as outlined in the chart below:

This project is needed for several reasons. It has been determined that there is under performance of the pump station due to slippage between the magnetic drive and pump shafts and due to the age of the facility components, many of the parts have to be custom built. With the performance of the pumps, the lower discharge velocity within the force main may cause solids to build up within the main, thus providing a lower flow capacity within the main. As a result, there is a potential for more sewer overflows and overloading of the station during wet weather.

Funding for the Preliminary Engineering work, which includes Planning, Design, Permitting, Bidding and Award and Construction Administration and Inspection, will be reimbursed from proceeds of the Grant/Loan. At the time of this writing, the cost for these services are under review and negotiation with a final fee to be forthcoming.

Including the closing fees, the total estimated cost of this project is \$1,836,000.
