Minutes of the Vance County Board of Education

March 11, 2013

The Vance County Board of Education met in regular session on Monday, March 11, 2013, 7:00 p.m., Administrative Services Center Board Room. Board members present were: Gloria J. White, Chair, Darlynn P. Oxendine, Vice Chair, Margaret A. Ellis, Ruth M. Hartness, Dorothy M. Williams and Edward B. Wilson. Senior staff members present were: Ronald E. Gregory, Superintendent, Dr. Trixie J. Brooks, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction, Dr. Brian K. Creasman, Assistant Superintendent for Administration/ Instructional Support, Angela Miles, Assistant Director for Human Resources, Steven Graham, Finance Officer, Terri Hedrick, Public Information Officer, and Jerry Stainback, Attorney for the Board.

- Mrs. White called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. and welcomed everyone attending. A
 moment of silence was observed.
- 2. Upon motion by Mrs. Oxendine, second by Mr. Wilson, the Board unanimously (6-0) approved the minutes of the February 11, 2013 meeting as presented.
- 3. Upon motion by Mrs. Hartness, second by Mr. Wilson, the Board unanimously (6-0) approved the meeting agenda with the following changes.

 - Add Personnel Addendum to VIII.A

4. Recognitions/Announcements

Mr. Gregory welcomed members of the 2013 Leadership Vance Program and recognized John Barnes, Chamber of Commerce President. Mr. Barnes thanked the Board for allowing the participants to attend the meeting and each participant introduced themselves.

Mrs. Hedrick shared the Leadership Vance participants are scheduled to visit Northern Vance High and Clarke Elementary as part of Leadership Day on Tuesday, March 12, 2013. Lunch will be provided at Northern's Viking Café.

5. Comments from the Public

Ruben & Martha Gregory shared concerns with the Board on coaches and other school administrators not assisting athletes in getting into colleges when the athlete has good grades. Mr. Gregory specifically spoke about his son, Xavier. He feels the coaches and administrators at SVHS have allowed his son to fall through the cracks. He is a good athlete in football and qualified in wrestling at the State level. Xavier has good grades. His GPA is 3.8 with a 1350 on the SAT. Mr. Gregory stated as parents, they have done what they were supposed to do. They have worried why colleges have not picked their son up with his grades and athletic ability. Mr. Gregory believes the coaches could have done more in promoting his son.

Mrs. Gregory stated students are not getting help from the counselors at school. Students are not given scholarship information. She feels scholarship information is given to certain students.

Mrs. White thanked Mr. & Mrs. Gregory for sharing their concerns. She stated we all want the best for the children in Vance County. The matter will be looked into.

(Emeron Cash, Board Member, joined the meeting.)

6. Superintendent's Report

- A. Dr. Harold Thompson, Principal of New Hope Elementary School, introduced fifth grade teachers and their students who sang a song and read poems they had written on "I Have A Dream For My Community." The song and poems focused on their self-confidence and setting personal goals. Mrs. White thanked the students for their performance.
- B. Dr. Priscilla Chavis-Lockley, STEM Coordinator, introduced sixth grade students and their teachers from the STEM Program located on the campus of Northern Vance High School. Four (4) students shared a power point presentation about their studies on solar energy and explained the construction of their Team JKLS House. The project was part of a challenge to students to ask, imagine, design, create and improve their solar house structure. The students constructed their house using small wooden sticks to make the walls and used lots of hot glue to hold the structure together. The students included very detailed rooms in their house. Rooms included furniture, appliances in the kitchen and fixtures in the bathroom. The roof of the house was covered with miniature solar panels constructed by the students. Each student took time to explain the process in designing and creating their solar house and gave Board members an opportunity to ask questions.

Mrs. White thanked the students for sharing their presentation and congratulated them for a job well done.

We need to work on getting teachers to buy-in to the program. If teachers are using them, then students will get excited and want to use them also.
 - Mr. Cash stated he had recently visited Garland, NC and learned that students were typing everything on the computer and were not being taught cursive writing. He wants our students to learn cursive writing. Dr. Brooks stated the Board approved a policy that required cursive writing to be taught beginning in second grade.

VANCE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION COMMUNITY AND BUSINESS RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Minutes Thursday, March 21, 2013

The Community and Business Relations Committee met at 4 p.m. on Thursday, March 21, 2013, at the Administrative Services Center. Those present were Dorothy Williams, chairperson of the committee and a Board of Education member; Superintendent Ronald E. Gregory; Brian Creasman, assistant superintendent; and Terri Hedrick, public information officer.

Results of Parent Survey:

Terri Hedrick provided committee members with a written report on the results of the Parent Survey conducted on Tuesday, March 12, through the school system's Blackboard Connect 5 telephone notification system. She noted that results for each school have already been given to school principals. The results, while representing a small number of parents of students in our schools, show an overall positive view of the schools in the areas of learning environment, quality of the educational programs, discipline, welcoming parents into schools and the consideration of parents' views when school decisions are made.

Discussion of Comments Made During Community-Wide Meeting on February 26:

Mrs. Hedrick provided a listing of the major points made in comments from students and citizens at the school safety meeting held on February 26 at E.M. Rollins Elementary School. Committee members reviewed and discussed the major points made by speakers. Mrs. Hedrick was instructed to develop a listing of positives and negatives from the speakers' comments in the areas of school safety and community safety. She will supply these listings to committee members as soon as possible. The matter will be reviewed and discussed further at the committee's next meeting.

Updates on Programs and Services:

Mrs. Hedrick reported that water safety classes for second graders have been completed at eight of the 10 elementary schools. School administrators and teachers have said that the water safety classes for their students have been a great success. The two remaining schools, Clarke and Dabney elementaries, will have their second graders participate in the water safety classes at the Henderson Family YMCA and the Henderson-Vance Aycock Recreation Complex in April. Plans call for the water safety classes to be held for all second graders again during the 2013-2014 school year.

The Leadership Vance Program participants for 2013 visited Northern Vance High School and Clarke Elementary School on March 12. Both visits went very well. The 16 business leaders ate lunch in The Viking Café at Northern Vance, with lunch prepared by Culinary Arts students. They then toured Northern Vance and the STEM Program. The group also had a very informative visit at Clarke Elementary where they were able to view teachers and students involved in several STEM projects.

Mrs. Hedrick also reported that 18 local public school educators completed the 2012-2013 Vance County Teacher Executive Institute leadership program with their graduation and a dinner on March 19 at Greenway's Authentic Charcoal Grill in downtown Henderson.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:15 p.m.

The next meeting of the Community and Business Relations Committee will be announced at a later time.
