- WHEREAS, as an upcoming centenarian, she continues to be active in Cotton Memorial Presbyterian Church and numerous community organizations.

The Granville-Vance Faith Initiative for Community Action

Education Initiative

The Granville-Vance Faith Initiative for Community Action (GVFICA) voted in April to make Education its next programmatic initiative. GVFICA is now developing and planning that initiative with the help of education experts. GVFICA board members and Leadership Council members believe the organization's focus on education will not only impact life trajectories of children in the community, but also support future economic development. Granville and Vance counties must have a work force able and ready to meet the needs of businesses that evaluate establishing operations in the area. This readiness begins with basic education.

Socioeconomic factors influence the lack of educational success within our counties:

- Vance County: 87% of public school children qualify for free or reduced lunch (in elementary school, it's 90-100%)
- Granville County: 48% of public school children qualify for free or reduced lunch

Almost every expert we have spoken to has pointed to the problems of education, especially reading, as an area of need in these two counties.

After speaking with experts from many disciplines (teachers, retired teachers, county school officials, economic developers, political leaders, et al.), all of whom recognize an opportunity for faith communities to impact education outcomes, GVFICA concluded it could have a positive, productive, and lasting influence on the success of our counties through a focused initiative.

We have identified three areas that GVFICA could become active or offer leadership to help existing efforts:

- 1. Reading
- 2. Mentoring
- 3. Student Resources (food, school supplies, jackets and scarfs in winter, etc.)

Our program structure will be based on an "adoption" model, meaning that individual churches and/or faith communities (or teams of faith communities) would adopt local public schools and commit to being active in that school in the three areas of focus listed above. We are aware that many schools have pre-existing reading buddy and mentorship programs, and GVFICA would seek to contribute to those programs within their current structure.

GVFICA will be intent on measuring our progress. There are three areas of measurable outcomes identified in the area of education:

- Increase literacy rates of children (specifically ensuring that more 4th graders are reading at grade level by the end of the year so that they may advance to 5th grade);
- Reduce dropouts linked to delinquency and long term poverty; and
- Provide base-level skills needed to attain higher degrees.

The newest data from the counties suggest that another potential measurable outcome could be added: increasing high school graduation rates. The 2011-2012 statistics put Granville and Vance as having the two lowest graduation rates of the 100 counties in the State of North Carolina, Granville with 63% and Vance with 68%. The most recent State of County Health Report cites the graduation rate in Granville at 77% and Vance at 65% for the 2012-2013 school year.

Education Initiative Planning Steps

GVFICA members and staff are engaging education experts to develop a program platform that supports the achievement of education goals, while recognizing and supporting the existing programs already in place.

In August, GVFICA will host an Education Summit, inviting key leaders in Education from both counties to come together for a time of discussion and collaboration. The Education Initiative will continue to take shape after this meeting, as momentum and community support continue to grow and consistent updates on the Initiative will be disseminated by GVFICA.

Education can and should provide a building block upon which community development and unity that crosses class, race, and religious barriers can rest. GVFICA is excited about the work it can do to contribute to renewing education in our two counties.

October 2013

CHALLENGE: MOVE MORE; AVOID TOBACCO

- ➤ Be active at least 120 minutes a week, at least 3 different days a week; at least 10 minutes per time.
- ➤ If you smoke and have health insurance, check to see what cessation benefits you have.
- ➤ If you smoke, call the NC Quitline at 1-800-QUITNOW at least once to learn what they offer.
- > If you don't smoke, share this info with a smoker.

Key behaviors:

- (7) Avoid tobacco use

November 2013

CHALLENGE: RETHINK YOUR DRINK

EXPLANATION OF THE REQUEST

This is a request to amend the zoning map and to rezone 1 parcel from Residential Low Density (R-30) to Agricultural Residential (AR).

PROPERTY INFORMATION

LOCATION: 324 Greystone Road; More specifically identified as tax parcel 0615A02008.

EXISTING LAND USE: The parcel is currently zoned R-30 and includes an existing storage/garage structure and an existing single wide mobile home.

SURROUNDING LAND USE: The surrounding land use is predominantly residential in a rural setting as well as agricultural in nature. The property has R-30 (low density residential) zoning on the front and sides and is bordered by A-R (Agricultural Residential) zoning to the rear.



SIZE: The parcel is 1.056 acres as shown on the included recombination survey.

ZONING HISTORY: All lots in this area along Greystone Road are zoned as they were since countywide zoning was established in November 2011.

IMPACTS

This rezoning appears to have minimal if any impacts on traffic, schools, or fire/EMS related impacts. The rezoning lowers the allowable density contributing to maintaining the rural character of the county. A rezoning to A-R does change the allowable uses; however a conditional use permit with public input would be required for those uses that may have greater impacts.

STAFF COMMENTS

The rezoning request as presented would change the property's zoning from R-30 to AR zoning. This request is being made as a first step to allow an auto repair business to operate within an existing storage/garage structure located on the property. If the rezoning is approved then the applicant will move on to the conditional use permit approval process with the Board of Adjustment. This is due to the fact that auto repair businesses are not permitted within the R-30 zoning area and are only permitted within the AR zoning area with a conditional use permit.

In considering any rezoning request it is important to consider the overall impact that the new zoning category could have irrespective of any particular planned use in mind. For the most part R-30 and AR zoning categories are similar – both are rural in character, both allow low density residential living, both are prevalent throughout the county and both are complementary of each other. From a density standpoint AR involves larger lots (greater than 1 acre) and allows certain larger scale uses that are necessary to support rural areas by way of a conditional use permit.

From a review of the land use plan, this particular area is not within any designated development area and is essentially within a rural area in the county. Additionally, the area to be rezoned is surrounded by both R-30 and AR zoning categories and would maintain the rural character of the county. As such a rezoning from R-30 to AR appears consistent with the character of the surrounding area and neighborhood and is a reasonable request.

PLANNING BOARD RECOMMENDATION: Recommended approval of rezoning on August 14, 2014. **Attachments:** Rezoning Application, Aerial View Map, Recombination Survey, site plan and sketch.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Whenever the Board of Commissioners makes a decision to adopt or to reject a zoning amendment, the board must approve a written statement describing whether the action is consistent with an adopted comprehensive plan. The statement must also address why the board considers the action taken to be reasonable and in the public interest. The board is not required to follow its adopted plans in zoning decisions, but must consider its reasons for deciding to follow the plan or not.

Draft Rationale for Board of Commissioners Approval: The existence of both low density residential and agricultural residential zoning within this area corresponds with the character of the area. Therefore, the rezoning from low density residential to agricultural residential is reasonable and consistent with the county's land use plan and continues to maintain the rural character of the County.

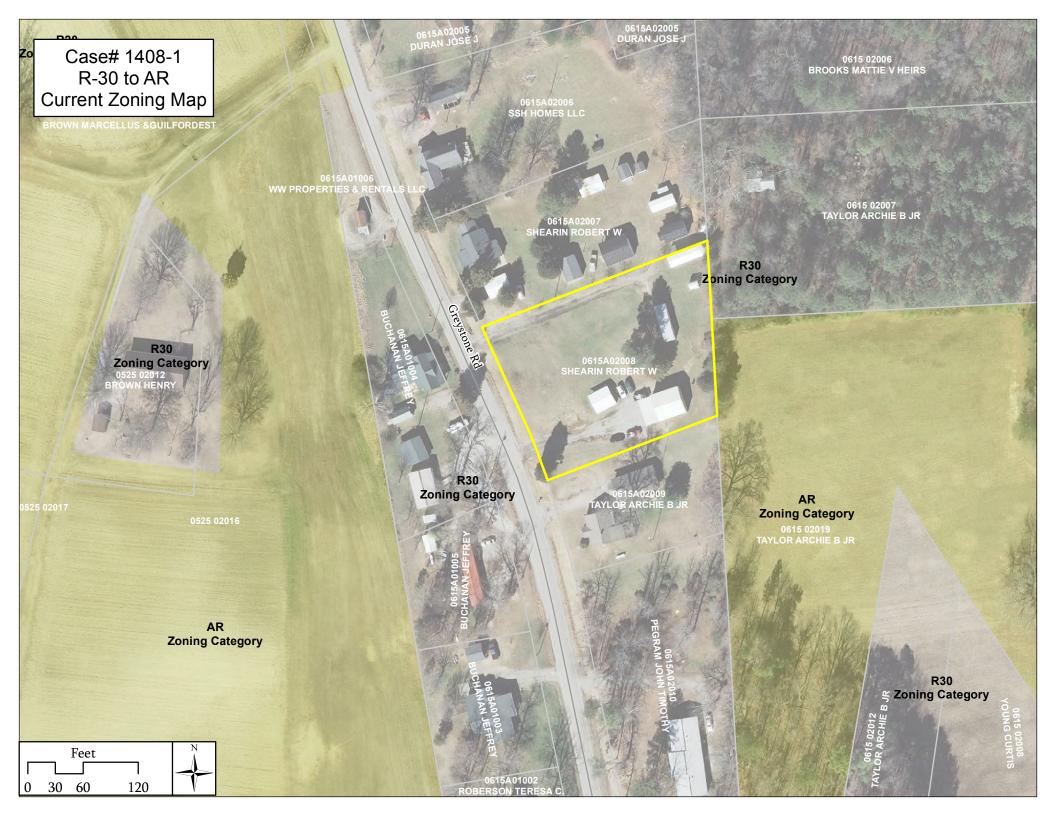

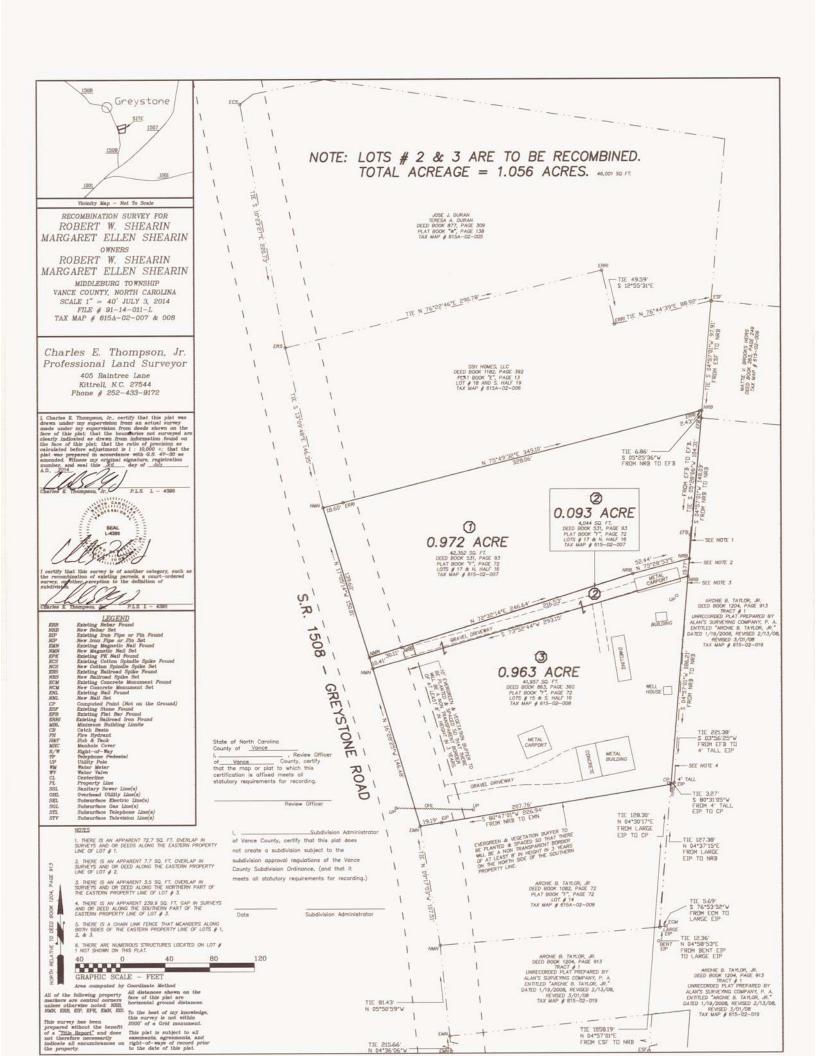

Vance County Committee Reports and Recommendations September 8, 2014

Water Planning Committee

This committee met on September 3, 2014 and completed a review of the monthly construction and operations reports, considered an amendment to the Water Rules allowing for an account adjustment for a water leak, discussed a desire to meet with the city regarding expansion of waterlines in the Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) and in close proximity to city waterlines, and reviewed the established monthly base rate.

- (1) Monthly Construction and Operations Reports (Phase 1A & 2A/2B). As requested by the full board the committee has reviewed and fully discussed the reports with the engineers and Envirolink. The committee discussed adding landscaping at the Phase 1A tank site as well as fence slates at the meter vault sites to fulfill zoning requirements. It is anticipated that these will be brought back as change orders for consideration by the committee and full board at a later time. Additionally the committee discussed the need for a 60 day extension for the phase 2 construction due to weather and other delays early in the project with a soft goal of having the system operational in 75 days. The committee also reviewed the monthly operation report and was informed that progress is being made in updating mailing addresses and collecting availability fees from those customers in Phase 1A who signed up for water, but have not yet connected to the system. For information only.
- (2) Amendment to Water Rule #6 Account Adjustment for a Water Leak. During the committee meeting in July 2014 it was recommended for staff to draft a leak policy to help in addressing situations where a resident has a verifiable leak on their side of the water meter. During this month's meeting the committee reviewed the leak policy as drafted by Envirolink, staff and the county attorney. The committee discussed and made changes to the draft specifically to clarify that account adjustments would be made based upon billing cycles as opposed to a typical monthly basis.

Recommendation: Approve the water leak policy as reviewed and finalized by the water planning committee.

(3) Expansion of waterlines within the City's ETJ and near existing City of Henderson water lines. The committee discussed the impact of current restrictions which limit the ability for expansion of county waterlines within the City ETJ and within proximity to existing city waterlines. The committee pointed out that several commissioner districts have the potential for being affected by these restrictions and expressed a desire to meet and discuss with the city. The committee would like the meetings to be an opportunity to collaborate and cooperate in order to find solutions for providing additional water service to these transitional areas. The committee reiterated their priority to serve as many citizens

within the existing water district boundaries while leaving open the possibility of serving additional citzens beyond the district boundaries if it would contribute to the financial stability of the water system. The committee was made aware that amendments would need to be made to the preliminary engineering report and the environmental reports with approval by USDA before waterlines could be extended beyond the current district boundaries.

Recommendation: Authorize the planning and environmental committee to meet with city representatives to discuss areas for collaboration between the City and County water systems.

(4) Review of the established base fee. This item was previously reviewed by the committee in April 2014 and June 2014. At the request of the Chairperson, the committee reconsidered adjusting the base fee from \$30 to \$20. The committee discussed the adverse financial impact to the water system and the general fund that could add an additional debt of approximately \$117,000 per year with the reduction in base rate from \$30 to \$20. The committee directed staff to prepare a comparison of deficits for the full board review showing base fees of \$20 per month, \$25 per month, and \$30 per month. Recommendation: The committee voted 2-1 to recommend maintaining the current base rate of \$30. If desired, the full board can take action on this item.

Status Report

The tie at Aycock Road and Stewart Farm Road is complete. The site has been restored, mud remove and backfilled with fill dirt brought to the site, and rip rap is in place. The site has been seeded and mulched. Ductile Iron pipe was used for the crossing, and all pipe located on DOT rights-of-way has a minimum 36" of cover. There is no construction of new water mains currently taking place.

The electric service installation at the meter vault on John Deere Road is currently operational and can accommodate a sump pump as intended. Installation of a sump pump was not included in the change order for this work.

Construction of the booster pump station at the base on the elevated tank on Warrenton Road is under way and is anticipated to be complete within the next 30 days.

There are some remaining homeowner issues currently being evaluated and addressed. In some cases the water mains were installed a year or more ago, and it is difficult to determine whether the installation of the water lines is the cause for the concerns or some other issues.

Investigation of an extended warranty bond for the Rock Mill Road directional bore is on going as well.

Partial Certifications

Partial Certification was submitted to NC DENR Public Water Supply Section on August 15, 2014 and approved by their letters dated August 19, 2014, a copy of which are attached. This certification included the remaining portion of Stewart Farm Road, Tower Road Extension, Village Drive, Hamp Faulkner Road, Aycock Road, and Kitts Landing. The only road not currently certified is Abbey's Lane, as well as any other roads that may be added with available funds due to construction cost under runs.

Vance County Water District Status Update September 8, 2014

Phase 2A

Contracts 1 & 2 - To date the Contractor (Hawley Construction) has completed the installation of the contracted water mains. Approximately 95% of the testing is also complete. The Contractor is actively working on installing the water service connections and those are approximately 65% completed. The contractor is also working on general clean up of the site, addressing complaints and preparing the site for a final inspection. The Contractor's Sub continued without success on the Hicksboro Rd. directional bore on August 13th. I visited the site that date with NCDOT and informed the contractor to restore the site and that we would pursue other options. On August 28, 2014 we received approval to cross over the top of the culvert with traditional excavation and trenching methods. There will be no net increase in cost as a result, in fact it will be a cost savings. The Contractor will begin this work during the first week in September and should be completed within two weeks which will complete the original contracted water main installation. The booster pump station on Highway 39 is under construction the BPS building was set during the last week in August and work is ongoing.

Phase 2B

Contract 1 - To date the Contractor (Gaines and Company) has completed the installation of the contracted water mains. Testing is mostly complete and still ongoing. The contractor is currently working on final clean-up and has begun installing water services.

Contract 3 – Tank – The Tank painting has begun and should be completed by early September.

General:

Design of the additional water mains as approved by the BOC is ongoing and we intend to make a submittal to regulatory agencies by mid-September.

Water Rule #6

E. ACCOUNT ADJUSTMENT FOR A WATER LEAK

1. Identification of a Water Leak

A customer may request an adjustment to their account from the Vance County Water District when the customer identifies and fixes a leak that was caused by conditions beyond the customer's reasonable control. This adjustment will only be available once every three years. The Water District will not allow any credit to the customer's account for any plumbing bills, property damage or other related expenses associated with the water leak. Requesting an account adjustment for a water leak does not postpone or delay the customer's liability for the current account balance and timing of payments.

To request an account adjustment you must provide proof of the leak and repair. Request can be made by contacting Envirolink Customer Service at 252-235-4900 extension 1.

Prior to calling, please make sure the following information is available:

- a. Date leak was discovered
- b. Information related to who, what, where and when the repair was completed
- c. A copy of the plumber's bill, or receipts for materials purchased if the home owner/ tenant made the repair.

2. Adjustment Methodology

If a customer experiences a leak and has not received a leak adjustment within the past three years, AND the customer provides proof of leak and repair, an adjustment will be determined and made to the customer's usage charge for one billing cycle using the following steps:

- Step 1: Determine the average water usage over the previous 6 billing cycles. If 6 the billing cycle history is not available, the water usage will be averaged using all available data. The billing cycle average will exclude the billing cycle of excessive consumption.
- Step 2: Subtract the average water usage from the total amount of water that passed through the meter during the billing cycle in question.
- Step 3: Divide the overage in half.
- Step 4: This value will then be multiplied by the water usage rate applied for the billing cycle of the leak to determine the credit amount to be applied to the customer's account.

Vance County Water District Draft Account Adjustment for a Water Leak

An adjustment using the above stated methodology can be made by VCWD or their designee provided all supporting information has been provided. While a leak adjustment request is being processed, the customer will remain responsible for timely payments on their account or to request a payment arrangement. If an adjustment is not granted, the customer is subject to all current and applicable collection activities and termination of service processes for delinquent accounts.

If increased use is discovered or suspected after obtaining the water meter readings, the District may provide notice of the same to the Customer. After notification and/or if the increased use continues for more than 3 consecutive billing cycles, a leak adjustment will not be available nor considered by the District.

(Vance County water is purchased so the impact of this adjustment is that the District pays for the water but does not receive the revenue, thus, the entire customer base helps to pay for this policy.)

County Manager's Report

Vance County County Manager's Report to the Board September 8, 2014

- **A. Proclamation Fall Litter Sweep.** In the spring and fall of each year, the NC Department of Transportation sponsors cleanup campaigns to beautify the roadsides of the State. In support of the upcoming Fall Litter Sweep, the Board of County Commissioners is asked to approve a proclamation urging all citizens to become involved in making Vance County cleaner, safer, and more aesthetic. A proclamation is enclosed for consideration. **Recommendation:** Approve the enclosed proclamation designating September 20 October 4, 2014, as Fall Litter Sweep in Vance County.
- **B.** Rock Bridge Cemetery Association. The Rock Bridge Cemetery Association has now been approved as a 501(c)3 organization. This group was developed in partnership with the Vance County Appearance Commission and has accomplished a significant amount of clean-up and landscaping work in the past year at the cemetery. In addition, the group has made improvements to the cemetery grounds, markers, tombstones, etc. The Rock Bridge Cemetery Association is requesting a \$100 donation from the County in support of its renovation efforts at the cemetery. This cemetery was once owned by the Harriet & Henderson Yarns, Inc., eventually given to the County which later transferred ownership to a local church, which was unable to adequately maintain the facility. **Recommendation:** Grant \$100 from the Contingency to the Rock Bridge Cemetery Association to assist in its renovation efforts at the Rock Bridge Cemetery.
- C. Middleburg Steakhouse Project. The renovation of the Middleburg Community Building is being undertaken to accommodate a restaurant operation and creation of 25-30 full-time and part-time jobs. This economic development project is moving forward now that a USDA grant of \$75,000 has been received and is being administered. Bids for construction of a sewer system have been received, with the low bid exceeding available funds. There are additional costs for other items such as building renovations, parking improvements, etc., all of which total \$69,000. Commissioner Archie Taylor has worked closely with the Town of Middleburg on the project. Recommendation: Appropriate up to \$69,000 from Golden LEAF Foundation Economic Catalyst Grant repayment funds (subject to GLF approval) for the Middleburg Steakhouse economic development project, of which \$45,000 would be a grant and \$24,000 would be a loan to the Town of Middleburg. The no-interest loan will be paid back to the County at \$300.00 per month, beginning July 1, 2015.
- **D.** Grant Extension for Semprius. A report on this project will be provided at the meeting by a Semprius representative. *Recommendation:* Provide an 18-month extension for a State Building Reuse Grant.

E. Adoption of Board of Health Rule. The Granville-Vance Health District Board recently amended its 2008 Board of Health Rule that banned the use of tobacco products in County-owned buildings. In August, 2008, the Vance County Board of Commissioners voted to support the efforts of the Public Health Department. The recent amendment to that Board of Health Rule includes the ban of the use of electronic cigarettes in County-owned buildings and public vehicles. **Recommendation:** Act to support the Granville-Vance Health Department's Board of Health Rule amendment that includes a ban on the use of electronic cigarettes in County-owned buildings and public vehicles.

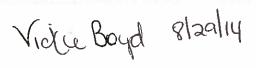

Risk Category IV applies to food service establishments that cook and cool an unlimited number of potentially hazardous foods. This category also includes those facilities using specialized processes or serving a highly susceptible population.

- (2) Provisions for investigating complaints and suspected outbreaks of illness associated with food, lodging, and institutional facilities, and public swimming pools. Corrective actions shall be taken in cases of valid complaints and confirmed outbreaks of illness.
- (3) Provisions for keeping records of activities described in Subparagraphs (1) and (2) of this Paragraph.
- (b) A local health department shall establish, implement, and maintain written policies for the provision of sunitation education for food service personnel and orientation and in-service training for Environmental Health Specialists. The policies shall include the following requirements for Environmental Health Specialists providing rood, lodging, and institutional sanitation services:
 - (1) Completion of the centralized training course provided by the Division for newly employed Environmental Health Specialists;
 - Compliance with Delegation of Authority as stated in 15A NCAC 010, 0100; and

(3) Compliance with the Board of Sanitarian Examiners' requirements.
